### St. Louise de Marillac Feast Day May 9

St. Louise de Marillac was born August 12, 1591. She married Antoine LeGras on February 5, 1613, had a son named Michel, and was widowed on December 21, 1625. St. Vincent de Paul then became



her spiritual director and, under his guidance, she became active in caring for the poor and in visiting the Confraternities of Charity. With Vincent, Louise cofounded the Daughters of Charity on November 29, 1633. She died March 15, 1660, and was canonized in 1934. 




Shout out to our conference president, Peter Walters, for leading the parish seder supper as part of the Eucharistic Revival celebrations.

# PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF OUR SERVICE

Rule of the International Confederation of SVdP

- 1.2 The Vincentian Vocation: The vocation of the Society's members, who are called Vincentians, is to follow Christ through service to those in need and so bear witness to His compassionate and liberating love. Members show their commitment through person-to-person contact. Vincentians serve in hope.
- 1.3 Any form of personal help... No work of charity is foreign to the Society. It includes any form of help that alleviates suffering or deprivation and promotes human dignity and personal integrity in all their dimensions.
- 1.4...to anyone in need: The Society serves those in need regardless of creed, ethnic or social background, health, gender, or political opinions.
- 1.5 To Seek Out the Poor: Vincentians strive to seek out and find those in need and the forgotten, the victims of exclusion or adversity.
- 1.6 Adaptation to a Changing World: Faithful to the spirit of its founders, the Society constantly strives for renewal, adapting to changing world conditions. It seeks to be ever aware of the changes that occur in human society and the new types of poverty that may be identified or anticipated. It gives priority to the poorest of the poor and to those who are most rejected by society
